Course Objectives and Content + [Course Calendar Description Link](#)

In this survey course, you can develop a broad understanding of Psychology. PSYC 1107 examines *biological, cognitive, and environmental psychological* explanations of people / creatures.

In PSYC 1106 and this course, you explore theories and findings which provide an **academic foundation for various university programs** in addition to Psychology-specific specializations.

PSYC 1107 Lectures will focus on *memory, language, intelligence, motivation and emotion, social influence, consciousness, health psychology, and select psychological disorders and treatments.*

Learning Outcomes: By the end of the course, you will be able to:

1. recognise core psychological findings,
2. contrast psychological explanations,
3. derive real-world implications of the psychological models and findings, and
4. evaluate explanations for various psychological observations.

Course Resources: Free open-source readings, back-up pre-recorded lectures, assignments, & other materials are available via the university's learning management system - Blackboard (BB).

Course Approach

Workload for Success: **Attend** every lecture in body and *mind*, **make** and **review** your lecture notes, complete the **open-book assignments**, and **regularly self-test** your recall and understanding of the material. A general estimate is that these learning activities will require **3 hours per week outside** of attending **classes**. Success requires sustained effort and focused work. Being brilliant may make success easier, but brilliance is neither sufficient nor necessary! *for real*

Communication:

For **basic information**, see BB (Lectures, Assignments, etc). I also regularly post **important information** on the BB **Q&A forum**. So, please **check the forum** regularly.

For **in-person interactions**, talk to me: before or after class, during my Q&As, or by appointment. You also can email me via darrenc@nipissingu.ca . I tend to respond quickly.

For **non-personal questions**, raise them in class or post them on the *Q&A forum*. If you are confused, other students are likely confused too. So, I definitely want and need to know!

Scavenger Hunt and Open-Book Assignments

Once you have Blackboard (BB) access, I recommend you briefly review the Scavenger Hunt and the 3 Assignments. The reviews will highlight the content covered in the lectures and the types of exam questions asked. To improve your question analysis skill, I recommend altering assignment questions to make other answers correct. This process also improves your ability to differentiate among related course content.

Due dates do not represent the day you start the assignment. **Work** on the open-book assignments **gradually**. Ideally, complete the assignments section-by-section as you encounter/review the relevant course materials. **Enter** and **Save** your answers as you work on specific topics. **Do not Submit** your answers **until all questions are completed**. Undoing premature submissions is problematic. With effort and attention to detail, you should score well, be better prepared for exams, and gain insight into the course content.

Scavenger Hunt online search of Syllabus & BB content (8%)

Systematically examine the syllabus, course BB links, and posted files to better understand what to expect in the course, the grading system, and how to find what you need to be successful.

3 Open-Book Assignments (27% = 3 x 9% each)

The assignments encourage you to review the course content in a timely manner. Each assignment includes questions which demonstrate the type of understanding and content assessed in each exam.

Exams (require detailed content knowledge and a clear understanding of content implications)

1. You are expected to **be available for** each of the **scheduled exams**.
2. You will have 65 minutes for Midterm (MT) 1 and 75 minutes for Midterm (MT) 2. [If SAS registered, your test time will be assigned appropriately.] **Read** and **think about** the **questions carefully**. Most people finish under the time limit.
3. **Midterm 1** is worth 15% and **Midterm 2** is worth 20%.

The midterm questions will focus on **all course content** (lectures, videos, etc.) **covered up to the date** of the test. The **date** of each Midterm is **in the schedule** below.

4. Given the large class size and the need for quietness, there are **minimal opportunities** for **questions during** the **exams**. If you provide item comments, I will use them during my exam review.
5. If **uncontrolled circumstances** cause you to miss a midterm, please contact me as soon as possible. If you provide me with a legitimate reason for missing and not too much time has passed, we will

arrange a make-up exam. If too much time has passed, no make-up exam will be possible. With sufficient justification, I will transfer your missed midterm points to your Final exam (↑ 15% or 20%).

6. The **Final Exam** is worth 30% of your final grade. The questions will focus on **all** content covered throughout the course.

7. **Supervised** personal **exam reviews** are available by appointment.
