Special Rates from all points in Ontario, East of and including Armstrong, Ont.; Fort William, Ont.; Sault Ste. Marie, Ont.; also Quebec and the Maritime Provinces.

Purchase one-way first-class ticket, fare for which must not be less than seventy-five cents, and secure ticket to that effect on standard Certificate form from ticket agent at starting point. These Certificates must be presented to the Secretary of the Old Home Week at the Registration Bureau immediately on arrival, who will fill in and sign them. They must be validated by a special agent of the Railway Company who will be on hand for that purpose. A charge of twenty-five cents will be made by a special agent for each certificate validated.

If the Secretary certifies that 150 or more are in attendance holding properly certified certificates of the standard form, they will be returned to their original starting point at one-half of the one-way regular first-class fare, plus the twenty-five cents paid to the special agent for validating the Certificate.

From points in the West, between Winnipeg and Vancouver, use Summer Tourist Fares, which will be in effect at that time.
